Tree-mendous Facts

Two mature trees can produce over 500 pounds of oxygen each year. That is enough oxygen for a family of four to breath for a whole year.

Riparian buffers are the natural vegetation beside a river or stream. The plants that are found here help filter out pollutants, help control erosion and help shade the water to keep it cool.

Excellent hiding places can be found in the leaves, branches and roots of trees to help keep animals safe.

Examples of things made from trees include houses, furniture, toothpicks, baseball bats, musical instruments, charcoal, fences, floors, boats, cabinets, canes, barrels, decks, doors, matches, canoe paddles, poles, pencils and much more.
