What is a Junior Ranger?

Virginia State Parks help people to enjoy the places they protect. As you explore Machicomoco State Park, you will learn more about the native tribes of Eastern Virginia, the plants and animals that call this park home, and what it takes to be a state park Ranger.

To earn your Junior Ranger badge, complete 6 activities in this booklet and bring it back to the office. Everyone 9 and older must do at least one activity with this symbol:

While on your adventure, keep an eye out for ticks!

- Avoid going into brushy areas
- If wearing pants, tuck them into your socks
- Check for ticks as soon as you get home
- Use bug spray

If you have a tick attach, grab it close to the skin with tweezers and pull straight up.


Favorites of Machicomoco

There are many places to see and animals to find here at Machicomoco. How many of the images can you find below? Make sure to find enough for bingo.






Algonquian Language



Ranger Research

Park rangers have many different tasks as listed below. All rangers and volunteers help in keeping parks up and running.

- Maintenance rangers help
 fix items when they break
 and also keep the park
 looking beautiful
- Resource rangers
 maintain the trails,
 remove invasive species
 and perform prescribed
 burns
- Interpretive rangers give programs to educate people and can answer questions on the park

- Contact rangers are the point rangers for directions and questions about the park
- Administrative rangers
 work in the background
 to keep the park running
 and order supplies when
 needed
- Law enforcement rangers keep the park safe for park visitors and enforce park rules
